

Newly Joined Members

The regulars on the shooting-line will have noticed that we have some new members fresh from the beginner's courses. These mustard-keen novices now need to be nurtured and guided in the ways of archery and Old Basing Archers. While the coaches will do their best, there will be times when they look to others for help and guidance. Please remember to make them welcome, visit them on the outside targets and offer words of encouragement whenever possible. Talk to them about equipment, show them what you are shooting, and discuss with them the merits of different bow types or arrows. Practice at the shorter distances with them and, when they are shooting well, encourage them to try longer distances or to record a full round.

The new members, in return, are expected to make friends by sharing a little about themselves to break the ice. They can also earn respect by arriving promptly to the sessions and getting stuck in when setting up and taking down the field. They should distinguish practice sessions from the serious sessions, when people are striving to improve their scores, and pick the best time to ask for advice. They should wait patiently for the return of the long-distance archers, while resisting the temptation to pick up their bows and practice their draw. It can be embarrassing to dive through the hedge when the bow didn't have an arrow on it!

New members can also perform a valuable service by buying those last-season bows from us, with advice from the coaches, and on the strict understanding that they don't immediately shoot it better than we did! New members spending a fortune on the latest gear will be greeted with consternation, tinged with envy, as we know how many fall out of the sport within a season or two. It also serves to keep the second hand price depressed for the rest of us thinking of upgrading.

Finally, seasoned or novice, if you want the help of a coach then please ask. We may not have all the answers, but we can observe and comment, hopefully helping you to find the improvement you are looking for.
