• Youth Programme

This August, in addition to normal shooting, and in spite of awful weather, some club members were involved in a youth scheme that took place every Friday on the rec.

The "Get With . . . " programme, for 11 - 16 year olds was established in 2005 by Sentinel Housing and is supported by many local government agencies and businesses. It's a youth diversion project, targeting some vulnerable children but open to all, that offers positive activities for kids to experience in an attempt to address anti-social behaviour during the long summer holidays.

Our coaches took, or were given time off work, to provide demonstrations of different styles of bow and get the kids shooting.

It was exhausting but in the sessions, we managed to get 80 children consistently hitting a target and enjoying themselves without getting bored – no mean feat considering archery is such a safety conscious sport requiring self-discipline not usually associated with 11-16 year olds!

The kids kept score for the final dozen arrows of each session and it brought out the competitive spirit. There's nothing quite like arrows in the gold and a chance to be top dog to focus the mind!

It was great fun all round and we were pleased to hear that the archery sessions, besides being very popular, kept the kids' attention for longer than many other activities. One or two came back three weeks running. The sight of TC retrieving his whistler arrow from the end of the rec, followed by his group of acolytes hanging onto his every word of wisdom was a joy to behold!!!!!

Following the outstanding success of this year's scheme, it seems highly likely that there will be a demand for a repeat next year.

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• Indoor Shooting

Indoor shooting is currently scheduled to start on Wednesday, 1st October at 8:30 pm in the village hall. The village hall has under gone extensive and expensive alterations to the stage area and consequently we cannot afford to have any misses. The club will be taking all reasonable precautions to protect the stage, but it is essential that anyone planning to shoot indoors has an accurate 20 yard sight mark. The cost of 12, 2-hour sessions is f 4.75 per week or you can pay for the whole term for $f_{26.00}$. For members who are using club equipment, it is possible to arrange to take club bows etc home and hence straight to the hall. You will need to complete an Equipment Loan Form and get it countersigned by a member of the committee.

Club Champs

The Club Championships will be held on Sunday 5th October and are the pinnacle of the club year. The rounds are York, Hereford and Bristols so if you have not shot a 12 dozen round before, come along and give it a try. Don't worry if you are not able to shoot your appropriate distance (100 yards for gents, 80 yards for ladies) as we will also be fielding shorter distances. Naturally only those shooting the distance for their age and gender will be eligible for the trophies. Following the competition, the prizegiving will take place in the pavilion. This will be a good opportunity to wear your new club shirts.

• The Wrong Trousers

Any one who has attended a tournament where the GNAS dress code is mandatory knows what pain regulation trousers can be. Green trousers can be interpreted as the wrong green by an over zealous judge and white trousers have an unfortunate tendency towards transparency in the rain. As clubs can now register there own club colours as an alternative to green and white, we have registered black trousers as an easily obtainable and more practical alternative to either green or white trousers. Green or white tops will still be required if you attend shoots that require regulation clothing. The alternative trousers are 'legal' now and our registration can be found on page 27 of the Autumn 2008 edition of "Archery UK". It would be good if we had a smart turn out for the club champs with either green or white tops and green, white or black trousers.

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• SCAS Junior Champs

The SCAS Junior Championships took place on Saturday 6th September at Rayleigh Town Archery Club in darkest Essex. Rachael, Richard and I got up exceptionally early, by our standards, in order to get there by 9am. The travelling was the first challenge; the weather was the second, with brisk winds and ominous clouds whipping over the field. Just under 100 juniors were competing, but only 1 other from Hampshire.

Rachael had stepped up to the Hereford, in order to contest the full SCAS Junior Ladies title, but found the 80yds difficult in the gusty conditions and couldn't equal her only previous attempt at this round. She shot better at the shorter distances to make up one place, but eventually finished just 24 points behind an Essex archer to take the silver medal. Richard, with his longbow, was the only one in his age group so only shooting against his own previous results. He achieved a good hit rate, with 90 hits in the 12 dozen, but his score didn't improve. Amazingly it didn't reduce either and Richard completed a hat-trick of identical scores this season, with 339 points for a Bristol II.

The shoot was slower than usual, partly due to boss replacement as compound arrows became stuck in the straw targets and had to be cut out. The raffle and prize giving only started at 18:30, with me picking up two raffle prizes before the kids picked up their medals. We left at 19:15 and took over 2 hours getting home on the rain-lashed M25, with Sunday and the Siege shoot just a short sleep away.
